Astrid interviews Gabriel Fontenelle

Gabriel Fontenelle grew up valuing culture, communication and, above all, love in family and friendship relationships. In this interview conducted by his mother, presenter Astrid, the 16-year-old reveals his dreams, aspirations, and musical references



ONE

AF What are your biggest interests inside and outside of school?

GF Outside of school, music and writing. They both help me release the thoughts stuck inside me, they bring me out in the purest form. At school I'd say it's actually learning, or even gossiping! I love good gossip, but also history, Portuguese and, sometimes, exact sciences. I really love talking to teachers, too.

TWO

AF How many concerts have you been to?

GF With the latest Rock in Rio, 80! It's been a long journey. At first, I hated concerts because of the Salvador Carnaval... Seeing that disorderly mess, if you know what I mean, and I know you do! I didn't even want to go to a Rolling Stones concert, but here I am at my 80th concert, with the goal of reaching 100th. I just want to know what it'll be...

THREE

AF Top 5 artists?

GF Beyoncé is the artist who shaped my musical taste, definitely the first on the list! As I listen to a lot of things, my favorites change, but at the moment, besides Queen Bey, I'd say that Victoria Monét, Kehlani, Prince and SZA are in my life every day. I also like listening to artists who are under recognized, but most (thankfully) gain notoriety. I'm more into R&B right now.

FOUR

AF What is your earliest memory?

GF I even remember the smell! I was putting lotion on your leg before you walked down the aisle on your wedding day. I don't even remember how old I was, but for me it's very remarkable. I still think I remember for the sake of remembering; you'd think it's just because I saw a photo, but what about the smell? It really is as far as I get.

FIVE

AF Is there anything you think you'll never forget? One emotional memory? GF I have two... The first is love, so I'll leave it aside. The second one involves my friends. Everyone who's with me, who strangely enough I see as much as you do during the year, makes up my greatest emotional memory. Apart from everything that can happen sometimes, I truly love everyone. I hope to have them forever!

SIX

AF How do you imagine yourself at 30 years old?

GF I hope to have a happy, well-formed family by then. I want a calm life, similar to

the one I have today, with a job, of course... Another question that people love, "What do you want to do?" Please, change the subject! But to give you an answer, communication or fashion, maybe both.

SEVEN

AF If you had a superpower, what would it be? What would you use it for? GF Everyone talks about teleportation, for its practicality, or becoming invisible to get the feeling of being a fly on the wall, but I'd like to fly. To fly around, travel to a city, feel free in the air! If I could play a little dirtier, I'd choose to control reality - it's very greedy. Then I'd have all the powers to do and be whatever I wanted... Very coach-y, right? (irony intended)

EIGHT

AF If you could change one thing in the world, what would it be? GF World peace is very Miss Universe! I think the world would be very robotic if it were 100% peaceful, but it has to be less violent. I'd change that, violence. I even have a text about this. Attention, anyone who's interested in good texts: Gabriel Fontenelle also writes, just ping me! We should follow Malcolm X, use violence when necessary, not on impulse or when deciding power with war, not even when you want to hit someone with a chair... Unless you want to reduce percentages!

NINE

AF A personal dream?

GF Getting married and having a family, very cliché. I have to work hard for that too, but love is all I want; I can even imagine when it'll happen. I want a daughter, without a doubt. If my first child isn't a girl, we'll keep trying until we have one. Picture me as a groom; I can see what it'll be like... Wait for the next chapters!

TEN

AF A flaw of mine that you would change?

GF You're very impulsive sometimes, not that this is 100% a bad thing, but I think it's your biggest flaw. You have few. There are times when you want to act promptly, without considering other solutions. It's rare, but it happens. You've learned well to control these impulses; soon you won't even remember the definition of the word.

AF It wasn't difficult, but it wasn't easy either. Whenever I left for work, I looked you straight in the eye and said, "Mommy is going to work because she needs to and she likes it." And my schedule used to be very relaxed. We had many meals together. And it's still like that to this day! I think this is a good formula for us. Furthermore, I set the agenda with your father, who lives in Salvador, for the good of the relationship.

FOUR

GF What personalities/figures shaped who you are today?

AF My mother is definitely the most important. Even though she didn't live with me, she was present and showed me how important it was to be honest with each other; then, talking a lot about the various prejudices of society. And all this very lovingly. Furthermore, I have the discipline that I recognize in Fernanda Montenegro, the passion for the profession of Marília Gabriela and Oprah... There are so many people.

GF Which aspect of your generation would you give to my generation? AF My generation is at the end of the baby boomers, the early generation X. If, on the one hand, there's the commitment to work of the boomers, on the other hand, there's an interesting struggle for independence of the generation X. Finding this balance is a good challenge for your generation, which, at times, I think is not very committed.

AF I want to see you independent! Flying high, knowing that I'll always be here to welcome you.

GF An artist to listen to for the rest of your life?

AF Caetano Veloso, Maria Bethânia, Gilberto Gil, and Tom Jobim. My playlist fits a lot of people.

GF A flaw of mine that you would change?

AF Your stubbornness - contradicting me, disagreeing with me, is always okay. But you could dial down your stubbornness. The world needs more flexible people.

With elements such as an oval-shaped headrest and leather straps, the piece was designed for the American market – and, until then, unavailable in Brazil – when Rodrigues opened his first international store, in California. But it was his fine art work that caught our attention recently, at the exhibition O Olhar Além da Cena, held at Estúdio Mula Preta. With curatorship by Paulo Borges, the exhibit displayed images taken by Louza around the world, during moments of break from fashionista work. These are everyday scenes in different countries, especially Cuba, which the Rio-born photographer has visited over 20 times. Also until February, like Tarsila do Amaral in Paris, two other can't-miss exhibitions (of the same artist!) are taking place in Brazil. The exhibit Carlito Carvalhosa – A Metade do Dobro is occupying three rooms at the Tomie Ohtake Institute. In this first retrospective of the artist in São Paulo, around 150 pieces, including paintings and sculptures, present the 40-year career of the Brazilian artist, who died in 2021. Another exhibition of Carvalhosa's work is being held at Sesc Pompeia, containing five impressive large-scale installations. Long may it continue

25 YEARS!

It's been 25 years of Baretto, with memorable nights, shows that have made history in São Paulo, and cocktails that are among the best in the city. May there be many more to come!



All it took was a first show in 1999, starring none other than singer and pianist Bobby Short, for Baretto to show what it was all about: transforming São Paulo's nightlife.

The bar quickly established itself as one of the most relevant in Brazil, precisely because its stage welcomed artists that, until then, only performed in grandiose venues – not to mention the piano nights led, for 20 years, by our beloved Mário Edson. It all started in a property on Rua Amauri, but, a few years later, the project found its final address. We're referring to the first floor at the Hotel Fasano São Paulo, with a charming detail that makes all the difference, created by architects Isay Weinfeld and Marcio Kogan: a hidden space behind a discreet door on the left side of the reception desk.

It's there, in an intimate and welcoming atmosphere, that renowned names in jazz, bossa nova, and MPB can present their pocket versions on stage. As Arnaldo Antunes, responsible for some historic presentations, said, "The fact that we were not on an elevated stage, the small number of people, the proximity between everyone, and the warmth of the house allowed for a rare, if not unique, vibe."

And, when there are no guest singers, the fixed program lives up to its impeccable reputation, having enchanted names such as John Travolta, Sharon Stone, Mick Jagger, and Chris Martin.

All this, of course, would not be possible without another renowned feature of Baretto: the cocktail bar. Created by the friendly Francisco Valter Alves de Lima, aka Bolinha, the list of 292 options includes one of the best dry martinis in the city, among other signature secrets. A place to go when you're not in a rush, to enjoy good music and drinks. Below, check out 25 legendary names that have graced its stage: cheers! **MEMORY**

FASANO RIO DE JANEIRO | RJ

Anyone who doesn't know the Fasano Rio de Janeiro pool yet certainly has the place in their dream. And those who have been there always want to go back. The fact is that, since the hotel designed by Philippe Starck opened on the Ipanema waterfront, its rooftop has become an icon in the city. After all, when do you have the opportunity to dive into an infinity pool that has the Arpoador, Morro Dois Irmãos, and Corcovado as its backdrop?



FASANO SÃO PAULO | SP

There's nothing like having a haven of calm and serenity in the hustle and bustle of São Paulo. And that's precisely the feeling you get when you enter the Fasano São Paulo pool area. On the penultimate floor of the Hotel, it has the same elegance characteristic of the project designed by Márcio Kogan and Isay Weinfeld and an incredible view of the neighborhood. To top it off, it's heated and close to the hot tubs and saunas. Everything to make your reset moment complete.



FASANO TRANCOSO | BA

Once in Bahia, few activities are as delightful as spending hours submerged in a charming, refreshing pool. At the Fasano Trancoso, add to this the fact that the project designed by Isay Weinfeld integrated the region's lush native forest into the setting. As a result, the pool is located on a 1,640 ft (500 m) deck in front of Itapororoca Beach, one of the most beautiful in the region. Oh, and the little ones have their own pool with the same scenery.





FASANO PUNTA DEL ESTE | URUGUAY

Here, diving could not be more bucolic: the pool was carved into the rocks on the property, a 490-hectare oasis in the La Barra region. Surrounded by greenery, it's just a few steps from a deck that has a bar and chaise longues facing the countryside. At sunset, the view is fascinating and, when night falls, the pool has lighting integrated into nature that makes everything even more special.



FASANO SALVADOR | BA

How can you beat the feeling of diving with a view of Todos-os-Santos Bay? On slow mornings, colorful late afternoons, or starry nights, the Fasano Salvador rooftop pool is unbeatable. To top it off, the place can also serve as a stage for intimate shows with the best of Brazilian music. And it's worth mentioning that we're talking about a historic, listed building, in the middle of Praça Castro Alves.



FASANO BELO HORIZONTE | MG

An intimate and exclusive wellness pool hides on the roof of Fasano Belo Horizonte, in the charming Lourdes neighborhood. The space, which is in the same area as the spa – which offers the most sophisticated services and treatments in the city – and the relaxing wet sauna, provides moments of rest and privacy between appointments in the capital of Minas Gerais.



FASANO BOA VISTA | SP

You don't have to go far from São Paulo to dive into a cinematic pool immersed in nature. Designed by Isay Weinfeld, the Fasano Boa Vista lives up to the country setting in every area, especially the pool. With an infinity edge and facing the greenery and the sunset, it offers a delightful breather at any time of day, which can also be accompanied by light dishes and drinks. There's also a lane for swimming at specific times of day.

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FASANO ANGRA DOS REIS | RJ

With contemporary design and a view of a paradisiacal, crystal-clear sea, the Fasano Angra dos Reis pool is an invitation to dive into the atmosphere of shade and fresh water. And it's not alone: in the Hotel's spa, overlooking the Angra dos Reis Marina, there are swimming pools for adults and children, including one with an 82 ft (25 m) lap lane.



FASANO SÃO PAULO ITAIM | SP

Life in the Itaim Bibi neighborhood is busy outside, just a few steps from the Hotel, but how can you leave the rooftop with the best view of Jardim Europa? Designed by the Aflalo/Gasperini firm in association with Márcio Kogan, the space is on the 21st floor and has an infinity pool perfect for spending long hours admiring the city. Good drinks, juices, food, and even a DJ can complement this activity.

BETWEEN SCREENS AND DRAWING BOARDS

The team at Architecture Hunter, a platform dedicated to exploring and celebrating architecture, comments on the symbiosis between cinema and the architectural universe

The relationship between cinema and architecture is a creative partnership that goes beyond the construction of sets. The two fields interact deeply when translating, into physical and emotional spaces, human experiences and the hidden meanings that support the plots. In a movie, architecture can serve as a silent presence, which transforms and elevates the narrative experience by shaping the environment, giving identity to the characters, and transporting the viewer to unique realities. It becomes an essential visual language that communicates emotions, cultural values, and unique atmospheres.

"Architecture builds not only the scenery, but also time, involving the audience in a dialogue that goes beyond the image. On screen or in life, there is a connection between human beings and the space they inhabit, an exchange of meanings. By becoming part of the narrative, architecture transcends the role of backdrop, becoming the silent voice that defines the plot, its atmospheres and secrets, as real as the world that surrounds us," says Luiz Ferriani, partner and executive producer at Architecture Hunter. Below, check out a list of movies selected by the platform's team to reveal the depth of the intersection between these two universes.



IDENTITY OF CHARACTERS

Architecture defines characters' characteristics and emotions, serving as an extension of their personality, reflecting their inner complexity. In **A Single Man**, by Tom Ford, the Lautner House, designed by John Lautner and the setting for the movie, is intertwined with the protagonist's story, revealing facets of his personality. The property serves as an emotional mirror, bringing to life his silent feelings and state of isolation.



EVERYDAY LIFE

Architecture in cinema expresses cultural values and reflects everyday life, using common spaces to translate universal experiences and emotions. In *Perfect Days*, by Wim Wenders, Tokyo's public toilets build a delicate narrative about loneliness and the beauty of simplicity. Wenders comments, "A toilet is a place where everybody is the same. There's no rich and poor, no old and young, everybody's part of humanity." The movie uses architecture from renowned Japanese professionals to create a setting that reflects the universality of the human condition.

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SOCIAL IDENTITY

Architecture communicates social identities and cultural values, playing a significant role in themes such as inequality and alienation. In *Parasite*, by Bong Joon-ho, the rich family's modern home contrasts sharply with the underground environment where the poor family lives, reinforcing the movie's social message and highlighting class divisions in urban spaces.

SPACE AS A SYMBOL AND MEMORY

Carrying memories and telling stories is another role of architecture, which becomes a character with its own identity. In The Grand Budapest Hotel, by Wes Anderson, the hotel is an example of how this universe adds character to the narrative. Recreated in meticulous detail, the space carries the story of its inhabitants, affecting the tone of the movie and engaging the viewer.

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ALTERNATIVE WORLDS AND FUTURISTIC LANDSCAPES

places. In Dune, by Denis Villeneuve, the fictional settings were inspired by architectural projects that take into account the arid climate of the desert planet. Villeneuve chose the Brion Sanctuary, designed by Italian architect Carlo Scarpa, to film takes that explore a detailed aesthetic vision of spaces. This architecture transports the viewer to a reality in which the design portrays the different cultures of the characters.

SURREAL ATMOSPHERES

In science fiction, architecture represents imaginary Cinema also uses architecture to create surreal atworlds, adapting to extreme climates and futuristic mospheres that transport the audience to alternative realities. In Poor Things, by Yorgos Lanthimos, with Emma Stone, Willem Dafoe, and Mark Ruffalo in the cast, the stylized setting is a portal to a visual universe that reinforces the peculiar tone of the narrative. Architecture turns into a language of infinite possibilities, in which the environment reflects the psychological complexity of the movie's characters.

In September 2024, I went to Peru with a group interested in photography. Some only carried cell phones; others had more sophisticated cameras. Photographers know that quality equipment is, let's say, an important part of getting good images, but what really matters is how you take these photographs, regardless of the camera being used. The trip was a pleasant surprise, as we had the support of a local photographer (@delriosudiego), appointed by Auroraeco, the travel agency that organized this experience. He made a selection of somewhat unreachable places and provided us with the necessary instructions to get there. And, of course, as the photos published here demonstrate, we also took the traditional circuit. Interestingly, I, a photographer trained in the tradition of studio portraits and fashion photos, had a huge challenge: how to make something relevant amidst so many clichés of travel images and, on top of that,

convince the group to accomplish something worthy?

Personally, I tried to avoid what Oswald de Andrade ironically called "black magic for tourists," something fabricated to appear legitimate. However, at some point, this fact prevailed and we relaxed.

We were tourist photographers with a thirst for the exotic. And the most beautiful part is that we watched life go by in these small pueblos, stopped fortuitously, and set out to take photos, capturing the colors, the people, the beautiful food, the architecture of the Inca structures alongside those of Spanish colonization. All this framed by the extraordinary relief of the Andean Altiplano.

On our travels around the country, we were also lucky enough to see the sun shine over the majestic mountains. Thus, we were able to enjoy the almost divine light of this exuberant place, inhabited by an ancestral people very proud of their traditions.

- The original peoples. They showed me that Brazil needs to be Brazil again. The time has come to say ENOUGH! of this toxic acculturation. We no longer want to live under the imperialist tutelage of iceberg lettuce. Let's put Amazonian Pancs [Pancs: non-conventional food plants] on the table. Canard à l'orange?

MY FAVORITE DISH

Coconut ribbon cake

BY Mazzô França Pinto

More than a beautiful and tasty dessert, the coconut ribbon cake created by Mazzô França Pinto represents the evolution of the caterer's career and has remained her signature for over three decades

"My grandmother and mother were great cooks, so cooking has always come naturally to me. They taught me how to bake cakes when I was still a little girl. We liked to make this part that, in Minas Gerais, we call 'Quitanda' - dishes that we can eat any time of day. My mother is 100 years old and, to this day, when she's in the mood, she goes to the kitchen to make the cakes we like.

I chose this coconut ribbon cake because it's the recipe that I've improved the most throughout my career as a caterer. When I was single, before moving to São Paulo, I used to make regular coconut cake. Then, in São Paulo and with my buffet, a customer asked me if I could add a festive look to the recipe. So I included some cream and toasted the coconut, but the result was nothing special. Later on,

COCONUT RIBBON CAKE

INGREDIENTS

For the cake 2 ½ cups (500 g) fresh grated coconut 2 ½ cups (500 g) sugar / 12 egg whites

For the cream 4 cups (800 g) sugar / 1 2/3 cups (400 ml) water 24 egg yolks / 2 small bottles coconut milk

To decorate 6 1/2 cups (500 g) coconut ribbon / 2 cups (400 g) sugar

DIRECTIONS

Add the grated coconut and sugar to a pan, stirring constantly until golden and flaky. / Beat the egg whites and mix them gently with the cold coconut. / Divide the dough into two round baking trays, each 10 in (25 cm) in diameter, lined with baking paper and greased with oil. / Bake at medium heat, 356 °F (180 °C), for 40 minutes (or until dry). / Let the cakes cool, transfer one onto a plate and cover with part of the cream. Top with the 2nd layer and cover it with cream. / Prepare the coconut for decoration: in a pan, cook sugar until caramelized. / Add the coconut ribbons, mixing well until they caramelize. / Decorate by removing the ribbons from the syrup and placing them one by one on the cake, leaving the middle empty. / When serving, add the rest of the cream to the center of the cake.

Cream

Make a syrup with sugar and water. Let it cool. / Sift the egg yolks and coconut milk. Mix with the cold syrup and cook over low heat for an hour, stirring constantly until it thickens. / Remove from heat and let cool.

an employee who worked with me suggested using coconut strips to decorate the cake, and so I worked on this idea.

The official version, which has become my signature, came about 30 years ago, when a customer ordered the cake for a wedding and I decided to decorate it. I put the whole burnt coconut strip on it; it was beautiful, a true ribbon cake. Then a customer's husband asked for a "hole" filled with cream in the middle, and that was it. To this day, for almost every event I'm hired to do, it's there. I've even developed one for a baby shower - it's a small version, like a party candy. This dessert really helped boost my career as a cook and is always present!

I like sharing the recipe because it's an easy and beautiful dessert. You just need to burn the tip of your finger (laughs) – be aware that this is going to happen, at least the first time. I, for example, no longer have fingerprints because I often work with high temperatures. I can make this dish very easily, with my eyes closed. The other day, I forgot about an order until the last minute and, even so, I was able to make it in time. But there are some secrets, like always using fresh coconut.

And what I find most special is that it's a living dessert. Just like wood, it's something that changes. Why? At certain times of year, coconut is drier and even more delicious. Easy to caramelize, the strips fall beautifully. The temperatures can also influence the final result... So it really is a demanding artisanal job.

The coconut ribbon cake represents the development of my work and brings back a very pleasant emotional memory. I've found places that offer the same setup and say it's their signature, but I think it's funny. I'm glad to have helped other people grow in their careers with this recipe that's so special to me.

It was a great honor, privilege, and absolute panic (laughs) to receive an invitation to review my favorite movie here, in the glorious Corriere! As a die-hard cinephile, selecting a single film is a most inglorious - not to say, at the very least, unfair (I prefer un-fckn'fair!!!) - task.

In fact, I only accepted this Herculean task because, precisely on the day I received this invitation, I had had lunch with some dear friends at the glorious Gero and, by chance, I mentioned that my favorite movie was Once Upon a Time in America.

In addition to being stupendous, the feature, for me, has a huge emotional load and memory: it was the last film I watched with my late father and on VHS! Despite the fact that I'm Jewish, born, raised, and educated in the strict precepts & (pre!)concepts, immersed in the rigorous ethics/behavior codex of this religion.

I want to point this out because emotionally my reading may be quite personal. After all, the story portrays the saga of a gang of delinquents, made up of young people, children of (poor) Jewish immigrants, most of them fugitives from the feared and terrible pogroms, perpetrated with extreme cruelty by the Russians, in the late 19th century, early 20th century.

The movie is masterfully directed by Sergio Leone, the sublime photography is by Tonino Delli Colli, and the score is by maestro Ennio Morricone. All

Through numerous alliances with the mobsters of the time, he even participated in the infamous Jimmy Hoffa episode, which is still a mystery to this day, just like the JFK assassination.

Nonetheless, it's precisely this (nefarious!) relationship that seals the fate of Max and Noodles, the main characters, and the downfall of the entire gang!

The movie is a genuine ode to friendship, bromance, love, fidelity, and, unfortunately, betrayal.

Noodles, who loves Max and is in love with Deborah, Fat Moe's sister, the only good character in the entire plot. And Max, who ends up screwing everyone... Literally. "Buffalo??? One way..."

And, 35 years after that line, the movie finally reveals itself... And what a stunning revelation, ladies & gentlemen!
